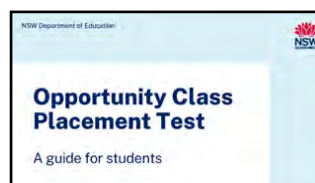
If your child does not live within our **intake area**, visit **out-of-area enrolment**. Out-of-area **enrolment procedures** are subject to the department's enrolment policy.

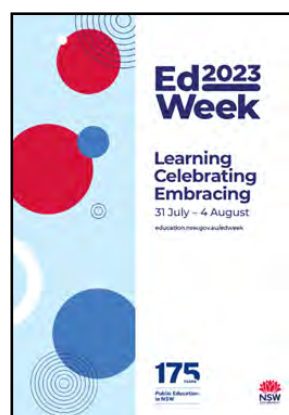
3-6 Athletics Carnival

Marvellous Moments with Mrs Hutchinson

Whilst Mrs Karam was gallivanting all over Europe, I was travelling round our school, popping into classrooms to check out what was going on.

I popped into 2/3K during a Mathematics session and was so excited to see the amazing number work that was happening. Mrs Pham had anchor charts on the walls demonstrating how to solve each maths problem. The students used these charts to remind themselves of the process for solving the problems and worked in ability groups to individually solve their problems. I was so impressed by the students' dedication to their mathematical tasks. All the students I spoke to, were able to confidently talk about what they were doing and why they were solving the problem in that way. So impressive! Such great work happening in 2/3K.



Next stop was to 6K, to see how they were going in writing. Miss Kry had been bragging about the progress her students were making so I just had to find out for myself! The students were using the book 'Alfred's War' as a springboard for writing. Their task was to write in first person as Alfred and the students created texts that displayed great emotion. I enjoyed wandering around the classroom, speaking to our Year 6 students about their writing. And Miss Kry was right! We have some outstanding writers in class 6K. Amazing work!



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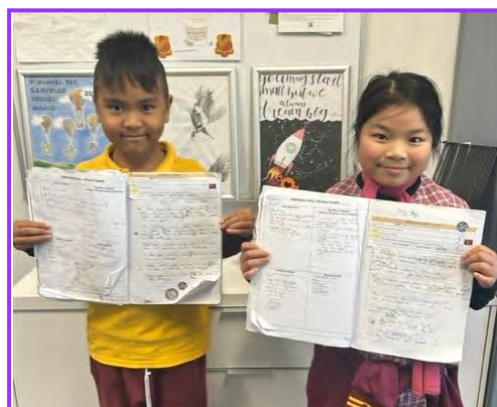
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Later, I dropped into 4E with Miss Earl to check out some great NAIDOC week work. The class were creating an artwork for our Education Week display and working on their writing for the NAIDOC writing competition titled, 'For our Elders...' The students were also adding some great drawings of their loved ones to accompany their heartfelt writing. As I wandered around the classroom, I was able to read more great examples of student writing. Students wrote about their mums, dads, grandparents...it was all so lovely! The class were also creating their class artwork, where they were painting their hands to create an amazing NAIDOC flag. The students got a real kick out of painting their hands – it looked like such fun!



Amazing Writing

I had a visit from some of our young learners in K Ningaloo to show me what they had been doing in writing. Boy- did they blow my mind! These young girls were able to confidently read me their written work with expression and fluency. They had independently constructed their sentences, spelling words all by themselves and using punctuation like capital letters and full stops. What great stuff out of our Kindy classes! Well done, girls.



I also had some students from class 3 Carey stop by the office to show me their fabulous writing as well. It makes me so proud to see such great examples of writing and for our students to show such a love for creating texts. What a great job our teachers are doing of fostering a love for composing!

Mini Lit Sage and MacqLit

At the start of the year, we received funding from Schools Plus to help fund our evidence based reading intervention programs, Mini Lit Sage and MacqLit. Our Learning and Support teachers then attended 4 days of professional learning which equipped them with the necessary knowledge, skills and understanding to deliver the programs and train our amazing SLSO staff.

Mini Lit Sage (K-2 Program) is now being taught 4 times per week to our students in Year 2 who need some extra support in learning to read. Although the program has only been running 3 weeks, we have already seen some pleasing results with students working hard to learn new phonemes to read and spell words.

MacqLit is a program designed for students from Year 3 to adulthood who experience some difficulty in learning to read. It is also being delivered to students in Year 4, 5 and 6 who need extra support in reading. Just like with Mini Lit Sage, MacqLit is already yielding some pleasing results. We can't wait to see the big gains students who make in reading by the end of the year. Stay tuned!

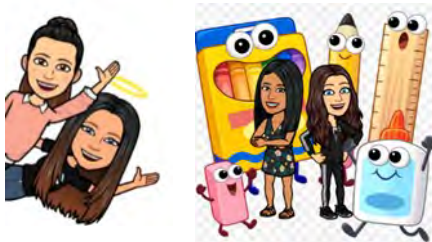


Goodbye from Mrs Hutchinson

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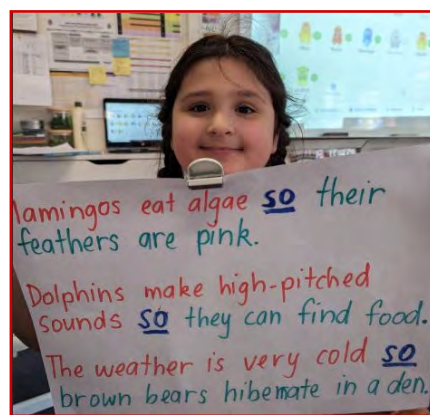

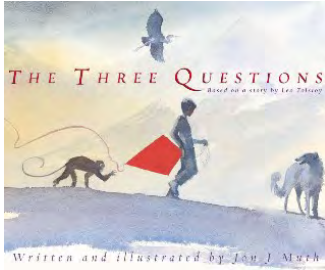
We all shared about the insects we have seen around the environment and learnt lots of fascinating facts.

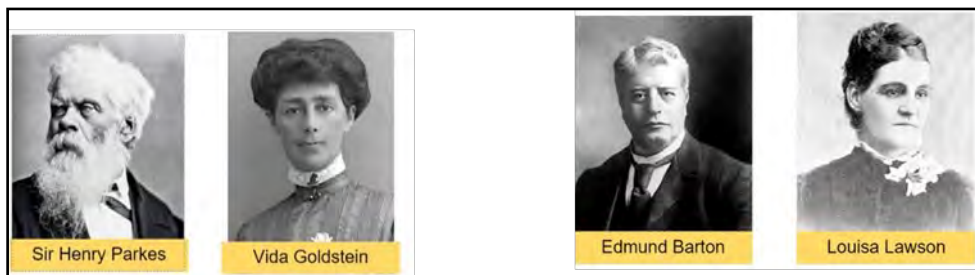


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6 Tjungurrayi are stepping back into history to learn about significant figures that contributed to the development of Australian democracy. They will use their research to write detailed biographies later on.

The children have been engaging in a range of experiences and activities that support children in gaining a better understanding of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives. These activities include drawing/painting birds from the Aboriginal Dreamtime story "How the birds got their colours", exploring Aboriginal symbols, and making the Aboriginal flag out of loose parts. At our preschool, we believe it's important for all children to understand and appreciate Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander history and cultures through play.



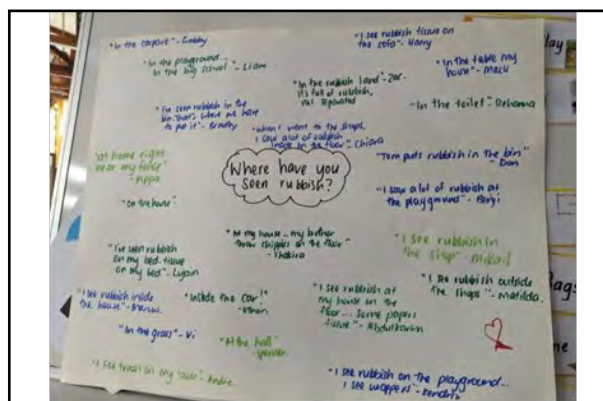
FAMILY ART CLASS:

Our weekly preschool family art class with teaching artist Mr Fry provides opportunities for parents/Caregivers to connect with each other through colour, texture, shapes, lines and inspiring images. SUSTAINABILITY:

Our preschool children have been engaging in an inquiry project revolving around sustainability. We aim to teach our children on how they have an important and active role in creating and promoting sustainable communities. We started off our inquiry project by reflecting and discussing where we have seen rubbish? This led to a journey of discovery as the children went for a walk along the big school and noticed that rubbish was found everywhere such as in our drains, on the ground and even beside our rubbish bins. We even noticed the ibis birds eating our poor rubbish that has been left behind. This inquiry question got our children to reflect on how rubbish impacts our environment, making them active citizens in our society.



PRESCHOOL BUDDIES:

Our preschoolers had the opportunity to meet their Year 4 buddies for the first time. Buddies allowed our children to positively interact with others which supports our little one's self confidence and collaboration skills. It allowed our preschooler to build secure and trusting attachments with an older peer, supporting engaging relationships and in turn a smooth transition for when our preschoolers go into Kindergarten next year.

THIS TERM, YEAR 6 IS LEARNING ABOUT THE STOLEN GENERATIONS IN HISTORY. THIS ALLOWS STUDENTS TO UNDERSTAND THE UNFAIR AND HARMFUL NATURE OF PAST GOVERNMENT POLICIES AND CONSIDER THE IMPACT ON FIRST NATIONS PEOPLE THEN AND NOW. THEIR LEARNING STARTS WITH A SUMMARY OF THEIR LEARNING ABOUT AN INFORMATIVE NEWS VIDEO FROM BEHIND THE NEWS.

During the 1900s laws and policies were in place which made it legal for Aboriginal children to be forcibly removed from their homes into missions and orphanages. In missions, Aboriginals were forbidden from embracing their culture. Welfare organisations abused the law which led to 50 000 children being separated from their families. The removals continued until 1969 but the damage had already been done. In 2008, Kevin Rudd acknowledged the injustice and apologised to all Aboriginal people all over Australia. However, even after 54 years, Aboriginal people still face inequality, segregation and the effects from the Stolen Generation.

Khoi 6K

In 2008, Kevin Rudd, the Prime Minister at the time, said sorry to the Aboriginal people. This is because around the 1900s over 50,000 indigenous children were taken from their loving families and homes. After, they would be transported to any orphanage or mission, sometimes being a white foster family. Their names would often be changed, they were forbidden to speak their traditional language and the heritage and identity of the children were locked away forcibly. When they were taken, they were taught to adapt to the White Society, which meant they had to cook and clean. Some were sent as domestics to white, wealthy Australians. Around the 90s, was when there was an investigation called "Bringing Them Home Report". They had stopped taking Aboriginal kids since 1969. Kevin Rudd's apology was the first step to stop inequality that indigenous people still face today. The mass impact The Stolen Generation brought to Aboriginal people is still here until this day. This is only due to some mothers and fathers that haven't found their lost child.



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DID YOU KNOW?



- BETWEEN 1910 AND 1970, MANY FIRST NATIONS CHILDREN WERE FORCIBLY REMOVED FROM THEIR FAMILIES AS A RESULT OF VARIOUS GOVERNMENT POLICIES IN PLACE.
- MANY ABORIGINAL CHILDREN WERE TAKEN BY THE POLICE FROM THEIR HOMES. ON THEIR WAY TO AND FROM SCHOOL THEY WERE PLACED IN OVER 140 INSTITUTIONS, ADOPTED OR FOSTERED BY NON-ABORIGINAL PEOPLE AND OFTEN SUBJECTED TO ABUSE.

The Behind The News video is mainly directed at younger children to inform them about the Stolen Generation. In 2008, Kevin Rudd, the Prime Minister at that time, made and read out a National Apology to the Stolen Generation, which was a major historical event. Over 50 000 Aboriginal children were forcibly removed from their families. They were forced to live in dormitories and institutions. Aboriginal children of all ages were prohibited from speaking their traditional language. Majority had to change their names and were told to adopt 'white ways'. Many females had to work as domestics in white households. They were paid little to no money. All of this started in the 1900s. Many Aboriginal people protested and started campaigning for change. Fortunately, the government started to take notice of them. Forced removals were stopped in 1969. There was even a huge investigation called the 'Bringing Them Home Report' to help reconnect the Stolen Generation with family and learn from past mistakes. Most looked back to the Apology but their hearts still ached at the slightest thought of the Stolen Generation.

Winton 6T

The Stolen Generation is a name given to a group of Indigenous children that were forcibly removed from their families from 1869 to 1969. During the 1900s, the Australian government took Indigenous children to institutions, missions, orphanages or place them in white foster families. At the time, these children were forced to reject their Indigenous heritage, attend church, adopt the white culture and prohibited to speak their traditional language. It caused pain and suffering for the children and their families. In the 1960s, people started protesting and campaigning to stop the Stolen Generation. The government stopped taking children in 1969. By that point, almost 50 000 children were removed from their families. In the 1990s, the government launched an investigation to help the Stolen Generation called 'Bringing Them Home Report'. The report recommended the government to apologise. In 2008, Kevin Rudd the former Prime Minister finally apologised to Aboriginal people who were separated from their families. Even though, the Stolen Generation happened a long time ago, Indigenous people still feel the impact of the white people taking their children.



- THE ABORIGINES PROTECTION BOARD ADOPTED THE ASSIMILATION POLICY IN 1951. THIS POLICY GAVE THE GOVERNMENT EXTENSIVE CONTROL OVER ABORIGINAL PEOPLE
- THE GOVERNMENT STATED THAT ABORIGINAL CHILDREN WERE REMOVED DUE TO THEIR WELFARE THE PURPOSE OF THE ASSIMILATION POLICE WAS TO ELIMINATE ABORIGINALS.

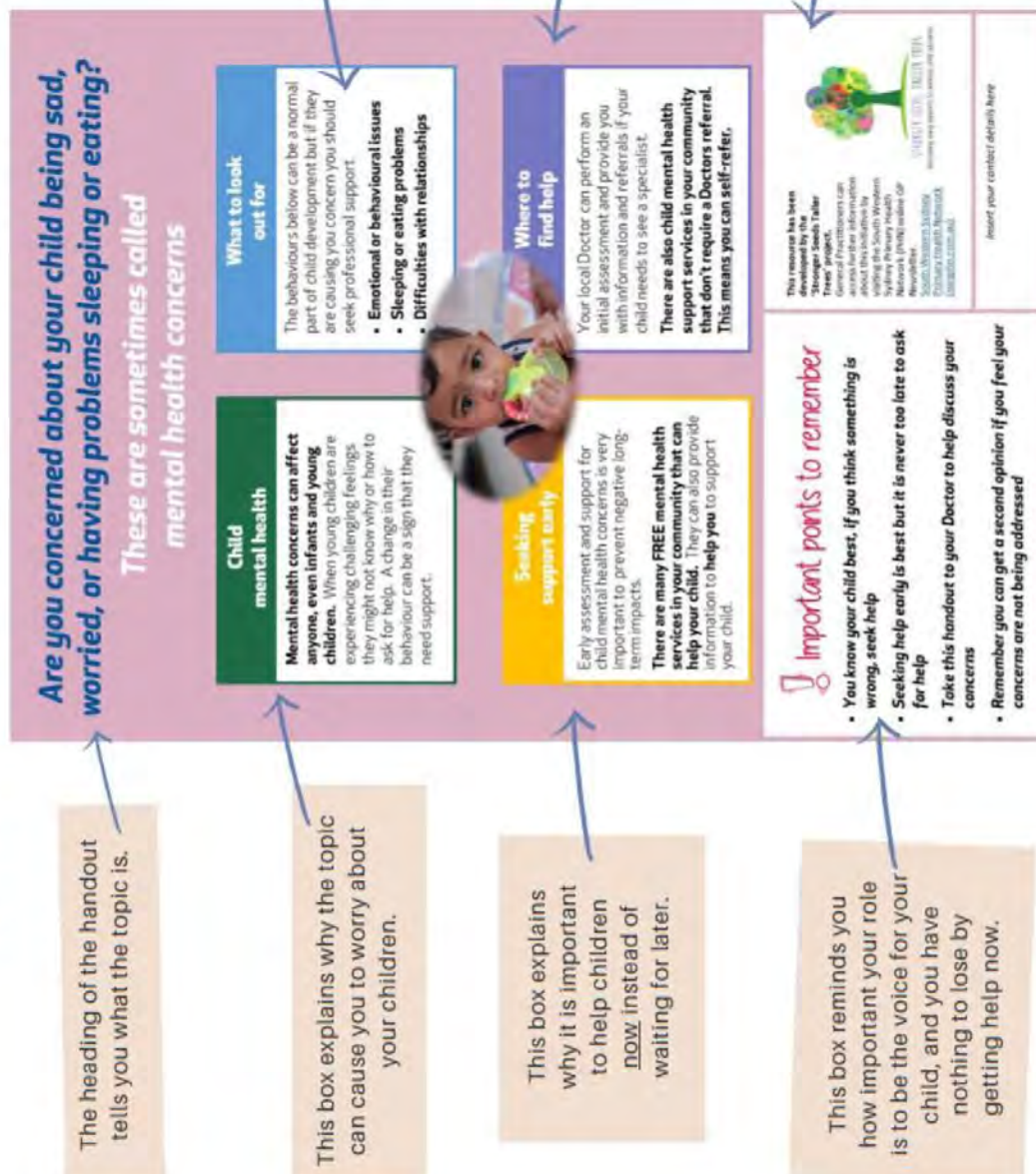
